16. There is one more point of great importance to be
mentioned, & that is the printing of the Chinese-Japan
bi translation of the four gospels & acts, which I
am persuaded both the English & American Bible
Societies will now be very anxious of seeing published.

As he fund raised for my translations stands,
as I suppose, exclusively under my name. I
direct that immediately Japanese types be prepared,
to be in readiness in China, whither I hope to come
as soon as my American Doctor arrives here.

I should much prefer if one of the Brethren
already in China were to accept the invitation.
This would save the passage money. If among the
Community of American Residents in China a worthy
family be found, so hitherto had not been missionarying
and now offer for this post they are quite welcome.
Their character & capacities to be approved of by the
Bishop of Victoria. Conjointly with two of the American
missionary Brethren in China.

11. You will receive a first file of journal, which
I transmit care of ~~the~~ Rev. John Wilson. that
our Shanghai Brother may also rejoice in the progress of
his mission & console in the afflictions of his brother,
purposely brought on him by the guilt of people
calling themselves a missionary Committee. ten
years, however. I beg to state clearly, apply only
to Commandant Barnes & Lieutenant Clinton, who former-
ly united their effort in distressing me, & do, as far
as I know, even the active Committee of our
Society, though none names figure on the list.

Of the present Committee I have not heard
as yet any thing, & cannot speak of them at all.

It is perfectly understood, & I declare it
here once more very plainly, that my journals
are my private property, & I commit them
to the Rev. John Wilson & your Lordships under
the condition, that nothing herein relating to our
own Committee, especially if concerning them,
be published. Our difference, which must be brought
before the Society, will be clear from my letters to
you, including all of the pecuniary arrangements
as set forth in this present letter. Another con-
dition of my entrusting you brother Wilson with
my journals is, that in case the present Com-
mittee do not entirely agree to pay me the
£ 1500 of my former account & the £ 300.

Owing next September I shall be obliged to consider that
some of the members of the old Committee still remains among
them, and that they continue to ruin both mission &
missionary. For the little sum I claim is pretty nearly
disposed of entirely for the support & advancement of
the mission as I find the mission must be helped.

It can despatch of this disengaging from me -
which would be a great misfortune, I cannot
entrust them with my journal or with any thing.
Norby they check funds, & should feel obliged
to declare to the Society that I disown the
Committee. I think it quite unwise for this
mission to entrust them with money, & that
our friends had better choose a Banker apart
from them, on whom I may draw according as I
shall see fit.

Our best regards to Mr. Smith & your
Prince. We are at present too busy to send him
things. & they will go better by a ship sailing direct
to Hong-Kong, which, under present circumstances,
is likely soon to happen.

My dear Sir

I need scarcely tell you that your letter addressed to me this morning was very agreeable. Nothing is calculated more to cheer a christian minister than to find the children of God walking in & ready to confess the truth before men. That you have confidence in me on the simple ground of my being a missionary, without anything else that might commend me to your favor, is also a strong indication of your sincere standing before God, & greatly contributes to make me believe the resolution you form to devote yourself to God & his service is formed in sincerity, & as yourself say, with simple reliance on the grace & mercy of our Lord.

The counsel you ask of me would at best be very poor human wisdom. Ask counsel & advice of him, in whom we find all treasures of wisdom. You have the anointing which cometh from above, & you need not that any man teach you. If god be for you, who can be against you? A man resolved to do any thing for god, through his mighty aid & in faith of him, will have strength given him for any undertaking. Be strong in the Lord & in the might of his power, & all things will be possible & even easy to you.

If your heart is indeed with the Lord - and, as already said, I hope it fully is - no better sphere could offer for the realization of your wish than Japan, & since this is accessible, Corshov, New missionaries will always be in a position effectually to prepare themselves for Japan.

Beyond the above concurrence in your views & the suggestion ventured as to the spot in this globe to which I should wish to direct your attention rather than to any other - from reasons which it would take too much time to write down, but which I am ready to state to you, whenever you may favor me with a visit - I think it unnecessary to say any thing further. my dear Lord! you see I have still leisure to write letters, certainly not more strange than my complaining of non payment from my Committee & yet having plenty of cash. How I manage to get time for the extraordinary variety & quantity of business rolled upon my poor shoulders is more than I can explain. often am I reminded of the words of holy writ: I said ye are fed," and again of the cheering text: "Baptizers of the divine nature". the is something of omnipotence & omniscience in man, upon whom the scripture ave come. God is his mercy though Jesus Christ exalts his humble people above their own strength & knowledge. & without their being able to explain it to themselves they are sufficient for all their things, which appear insurmountable mountains in the eyes of those worldly giants who look down upon us as upon grasshoppers. we hope on in our own humble way & shall get forward at an astonishing military speed.

Now I tell you, my Lord, that both your last favours, dated respectively June 10th. & June 13th contained all it needed to clear us on again in our hard struggle? a missionary brother, with wife and child, already on his way over to Tokashov - is vanishing, transporting & unspeakably pleasing news indeed. All my quarrels with the Committee are at an end as soon as I see they do something towards the carrying on of the mission, something perceptible on the field of the mission itself. for of all their work done at home, we hitherto had not the slightest perception here, except, perhaps, answers to their & other friends' progress, without which I should certainly be at a loss how to account for our being still in the land of the living, & evidently seeing life & light sowing & springing up in a land of darkness & death. Oh the joy & hallowed complacency of knowing this spark of truth which seven years of hard trial have struck,
