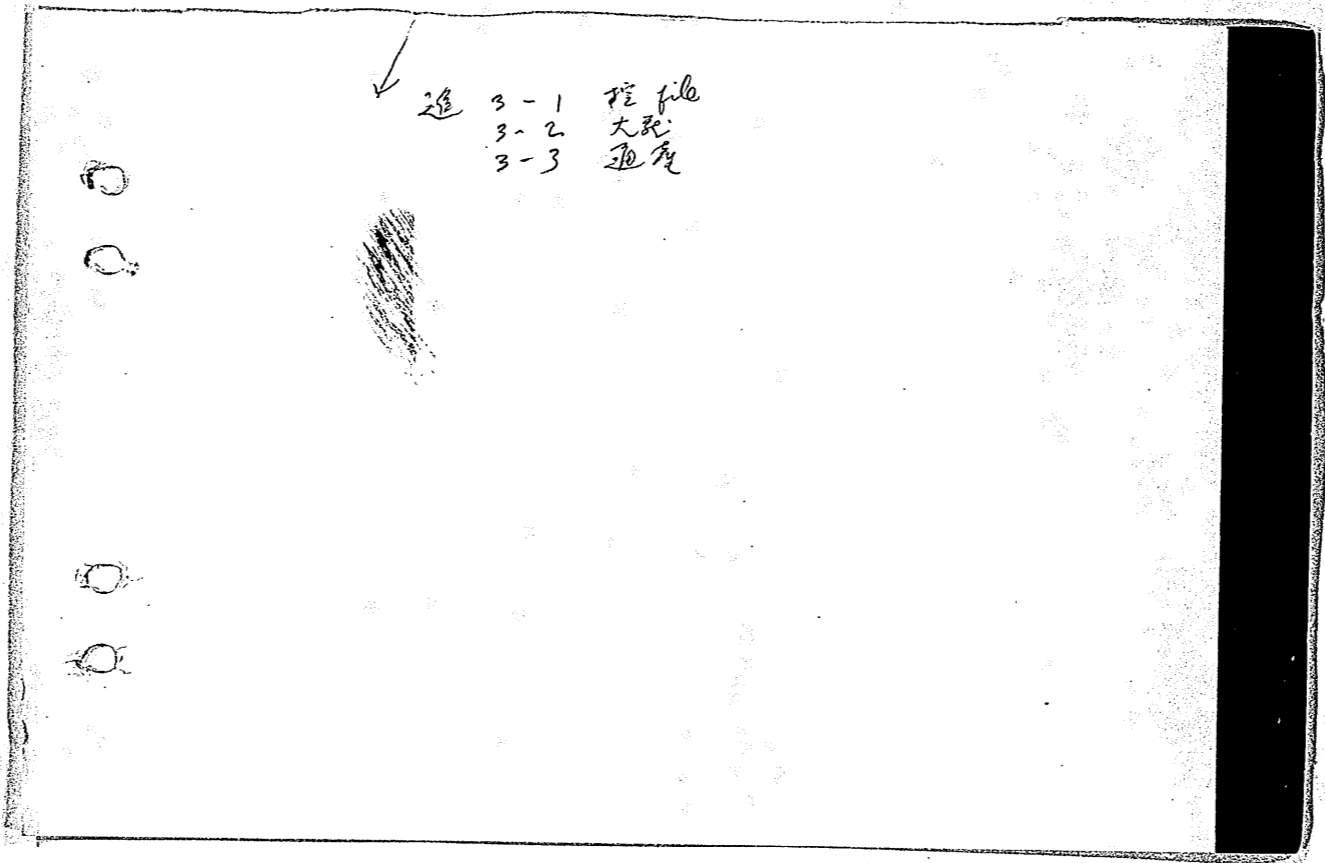

OKINAWA REVERSION: U.S. BUSINESS INTERESTS

On June 19, 1970 the U.S. Embassy presented to the Japanese Foreign Office the position of the U.S. in respect of U.S. business interests on Okinawa. Following are specific questions relating to the position of the U.S. for which the U.S. would appreciate answers from the Government of Japan:

A. The US has requested that the Japanese Government agree to recognize and acknowledge the validity within Japan of all foreign investment licenses issued during the period of U.S. Administration. These licenses are part of the public record in Okinawa, and all of them have been transmitted individually to the Government of Japan as attachments to completed questionnaires to businessmen circulated under auspices of the Preparatory Commission or otherwise.

1. How does the GOJ intend to signify its recognition and acknowledgment of the validity of Okinawa foreign investment licenses? (The USG prefers that the GOJ agree to language along the lines of the language submitted by the USG on June 19, 1970 to be incorporated into a subsidiary agreement to the General Reversion Agreement.)

2. When will the GOJ be able to signify to the USG its agreement to recognize and acknowledge the validity of Okinawa foreign exchange licenses?

3. Has the GOJ discovered any such licenses which the GOJ does not consider possible to grant its recognition and acknowledgment? If so, please provide a listing of such investment licenses and explanation of difficulties presented.

B. The U.S. has requested the Government of Japan to acknowledge the continued validity after reversion of all property rights held by U.S. firms and individuals as of reversion.

1. How does the GOJ intend to signify this acknowledgment? (The USG prefers GOJ agreement to language similar to that proposed on June 19, 1970 to be included in an agreement subsidiary to the General Reversion Agreement.)

2. When will the GOJ be able to signify to the USG its agreement to make the acknowledgment discussed above?

3. Has the GOJ discovered any Japanese law, regulation, or policy which would adversely affect the survival of pre-reversion property rights in Okinawa?

4. Regarding the leases to private individuals and firms of state and prefectural land in Okinawa which the Government of Japan has now examined, has the GOJ discovered any instances where acknowledgment of continued validity might cause difficulty? If so, please provide the USG a listing of such instances and explanations of the difficulty.

5. Two land leases expire according to their own terms upon reversion. Both lessees have indicated their readiness to negotiate with appropriate GOJ authorities substitute leases to take effect upon reversion. Who are the proper authorities for this purpose, and when will they be prepared to negotiate with the lessees?

C. The U.S. has requested the Japanese Government to agree to permit U.S. firms and individuals on Okinawa to convert and freely export in the form of U.S. dollars business proceeds from Okinawan enterprises. The Government of Japan now has extensive information relating to the assets and income of U.S. businesses on Okinawa and Foreign Minister Aichi has informed the U.S. that such companies would have no difficulties in this regard.

1. Will the GOJ need to promulgate special regulations to allow this conversion and exportation? If so, when will such regulations be promulgated?

2. If the GOJ does not need to promulgate special regulations, does the GOJ need to take special administrative action pursuant to existing regulations? If so, when will GOJ be prepared to take that action?

3. Will the GOJ treat assets of U.S. businesses in Okinawa as dollar based investments in Japan after reversion? In such case, what, if any, restrictions would apply to future repatriation of any such assets?

D. The U.S. has requested the Government of Japan to provide a transition period, where necessary, to allow for staged application of Japanese laws and regulations.

1. Does the GOJ consider it necessary to institute such a transition period? If so, when will the U.S. be informed of its proposed contents?

E. The U.S. has requested the Government of Japan to agree to allow U.S. individuals or firms in Okinawa to continue in the same business following reversion. The GOJ has now had the opportunity to examine completed questionnaires from U.S. businesses responding to the survey conducted under the auspices of the Preparatory Commission and to examine activities of individual non-Japanese professionals in Okinawa.

1. Has the GOJ discovered any firm or individual which apparently may not continue in business following reversion substantially as at present? If so, the U.S. would appreciate receiving a list of such firms and individuals and an explanation of why they may not be allowed to continue.

2. How does the GOJ intend to signify its agreement in principle to allow such individuals and firms to continue their businesses after reversion?

F. The U.S. has requested the Japanese Government to agree to allow non-Japanese individuals to continue their employment or profession after reversion.

1. Are there any such individuals which the Japanese Government now believes may not be allowed to continue their employment after reversion? If so, the U.S. would appreciate receiving a listing of such individuals and an explanation as to why they may not be allowed to continue their employment.

2. In what way will the GOJ signify its agreement in principle to allow such individuals to continue their employment?

G. The U.S. has been informed that the Japanese Government considers the point raised by para. G of the U.S. Talking Points of June 19, 1970 to be adequately covered by the FCN Treaty. How does the GOJ intend to confirm this interpretation?

H. The U.S. Government has requested the Japanese Government to agree to accept as Article 14 contractors a listing (to be provided) of qualified U.S. firms and individuals.

1. When will the GOJ be prepared to discuss with the USG the firms and individuals which the USG considers would qualify under Article 14?

2. Will it be necessary to promulgate a new regulation so that firms and individuals will not be required to depart in order to re-enter Japan as Article 14 individuals?

I. The U.S. has requested the Japanese Government to agree to record in writing our mutual understanding that Japan will impose no taxes in respect to activities or property in Okinawa before reversion, and Foreign Minister Aichi has told the U.S. that the GOJ would not impose any retroactive taxation.

1. Is the GOJ prepared to subscribe in writing to this understanding?

2. By what means will the GOJ record such understanding? (The U.S. prefers that language similar to that incorporated in its Talking Points of June 19, 1970 be contained in agreement subsidiary to the General Agreement on Okinawa Reversion.)

J. U.S. businesses on Okinawa are becoming increasingly concerned about tax treatment by the Government of Japan relating to pre-reversion tax events. It is vitally important that businesses on Okinawa be informed in the near future as to such tax treatment so that business planning can proceed.

1. If a firm should incur business losses in either of the two years prior to reversion and such losses would be allowable losses under Japanese tax regulations, would the GOJ permit carry-over after reversion of that portion of the losses not theretofore claimed for tax purposes?

2. If a firm suffers losses in the first year following reversion and such losses would constitute allowable losses under GRI tax regulations, would the GOJ permit a carryback and adjustment of taxes already paid to the GRI prior to reversion of that portion of the losses not claimed for tax purposes against the Japanese business tax?

OKINAWA REVERSION: SUMMARY OF QUESTIONS BY NON-RYUKYUAN
BUSINESS FIRMS AND INDIVIDUALS REGARDING
GOJ TREATMENT AFTER REVERSION

I. Questions Related to USG Talking Paper

A. Validity of Foreign Investment Licenses

1. Will the present GRI foreign investment licenses be automatically honored by the GOJ with no revision?
2. Will the provisions of HICOM ORDINANCE 11 be continued? If not, how will it be revised?
3. Can FIB-licensed companies expect to be allowed to continue their operations as validated Japanese companies?
4. Will the validated term of the present GRI licenses be cut or limited by the GOJ at the time of reversion?
5. Is it possible for foreign nationals to obtain a GOJ permanent license for their business operation on Okinawa?
6. Will various kinds of licenses to be issued by the GOJ be valid for anywhere in Japan proper?
7. If a foreign company has a branch in Japan proper with a GOJ license, will this branch be automatically allowed to operate its business also in Ryukyu Islands?
8. Our operation on Okinawa is now limited only to one specific location under GRI license. Will this GRI restriction be still enforced by GOJ after reversion? Do we have to apply every time we establish a new branch office in another location?
9. Will GOJ Ministry of Transportation authorize household effect-moving, storage and drayage operations by foreign firms? Or, will it be necessary to obtain two licenses?
10. Will there be any GOJ restrictions against continuation of independent corporations or Okinawa branches which are 100% controlled by US companies at present?
11. Will new or additional capital investment on Okinawa by foreign nationals be subject to GOJ restriction?

12. Will GOJ capital investment regulations allow investments in several different kinds of business by one foreigner?

13. Will the GOJ require foreign capital investment to include local partnership?

B. Validity of Property Rights

1. Will the current real estate rental agreements be honored and assessed by GOJ as they have been to date?
2. How about the status of houses and real estate owned by foreigners with or without GRI or USCAR licenses?

C. Remittance of Assets and Income

1. Will non-Ryukyuan remittance of invested capital, retained profits etc., to their home countries in US dollars be restricted by GOJ? How about transfer of funds to Okinawa from the US or Asian countries?
2. Will Japanese Yen be freely convertible to US dollar for profit and capital repatriation, or will GOJ limit the convertible amount?
3. Will GOJ authorize purchasers of houses and other personal properties sold by Americans on an installment basis to pay and remit to the sellers in the US in US dollars?

D. Transition Period and Quotas

1. Would GOJ commodity tax system be applied to Okinawa immediately after reversion?
2. Is there no possibility that a certain period of adjustment be set so that current duty-free imports can continue for a while even after reversion?
3. Will any special quotas be granted by GOJ to imports to Okinawa even after reversion, or will Okinawa be automatically placed under the same IQ system now applied to Japan proper?
4. Is there any danger that GOJ will refuse to allocate IQ for imports into Okinawa by foreign nationals?

NOTE: (There were many firms who asked if items they are now importing freely will be bound by the GOJ IQ system after reversion. See separate list of IQ items being imported by them at present.)

E. Continuation of Businesses

1. Is there a possibility that some specific types of business, especially those presently operated by non-Ryukyuan, be phased out under GOJ policy for the reason that those business areas can be covered in Japan proper in better ways?

F. Continuation of Professions

1. What will be the status of current professional licenses for non-Ryukhuan personnel (i.e. physicians, attorneys, dentists, veterinarians, piano tuners, etc.)?

Will it be necessary to re-register or re-apply for a GOJ license to practice medicine, law, etc., on Okinawa? If so, will it be required in Japanese language?

Is there any danger that vested rights to practice medicine or law on Okinawa may be restricted by GOJ?

2. How does reversion affect the employment of foreign nationals, including technicians?

3. Will foreign employment granted with GRI working permits be automatically validated by the GOJ at the time of reversion, or are they subject to GOJ approval anew?

4. Will employees of a foreign-managed school be able to continue working on the same status?

G. Non-discrimination of Laws and Regulations

1. Will foreign business firms be treated equally with Japanese firms both in Ryukyu Islands and Japan proper?

2. Will GOJ taxes to be levied on foreign nationals in Okinawa be higher than those on local nationals?

H. SOFA Article XIV and other USG Contractors

1. Will USG-appointed military contractors solely for USG agencies be permitted to function as they stand now?

If not, will the ample time allowance of advance notice be given for necessary arrangements? Will GOJ assist in dissolution of these contracts?

2. Will there be any change in the status of American firms who bid on military contract projects invited by USG?

3. How about the tax situation applied to US corporations doing business exclusively under USG contracts?

I. Retroactive Taxes

1. Will GOJ accept GRI tax settlements made prior to reversion?

II. Questions Identifying New Points of Concern

1. Will our present commercial air cargo service between Okinawa and Tokyo be able to continue? (The Flying Tiger Line, Inc.)

2. Will a foreign-managed school be able to operate in the same way without JFIB license?

3. Are any GOJ restrictions foreseen against American-owned English paper publishing, travel agent and international airline services on Okinawa?

4. Will Okinawa be a free currency area?

5. Would there be an immediate change of currency from US dollar to Japanese Yen at the time of reversion?

6. How will the conversion to Japanese Yen affect US military personnel's payment of services??

7. Will there be any change in obligations with banks on foreign-owned assets and properties and GRI leases?

8. What import duty policy will be applied by the GOJ towards current duty-free imports into Okinawa?

9. Will GOJ customs duties be levied on items imported for sole use of (sale to) USG agencies?

10. Will existing trade items stockpiled prior to the date of reversion be subject to GOJ customs duties?

11. Will the number of employees and investors in foreign corporations be limited under GOJ law?

12. Will immigration and residence procedures change?

13. Will non-Ryukyuan permanent residents be allowed to maintain their present status under GOJ law?
